

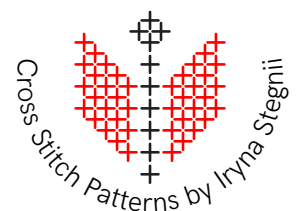
Natal Polar Bear Cross Stitch Pattern



Stitches: 58 x 81

Size: 4 x 6 inches or 10 x 15 cm

Step-by-step guide to help you get started with cross-stitching:

Step 1: Gather Supplies

Embroidery hoop: Used to hold the fabric taut while stitching.

Aida or Evenweave cloth: Aida fabric designed explicitly for cross-stitching, with a grid pattern of holes for easy counting. Evenweave has a finer weave, making it easier to stitch more complex designs.

Embroidery floss: Strands of colored threads used for stitching. DMC is a popular brand for embroidery floss.

Embroidery needles: Use a size 24 tapestry needle for 14-count Aida and a size 26 tapestry needle for 16-count Aida. The needle should pass smoothly through the holes without splitting the threads of the fabric.

Scissors: For cutting the floss and excess fabric.

Step 2: Prepare the Fabric

Cut a piece of Aida cloth slightly larger than your design and iron it to remove wrinkles. Place the fabric in the embroidery hoop, ensuring it's centered and taut. Tighten the hoop screw to secure the fabric.

Step 3: Understand the Pattern

If using a cross-stitch pattern, familiarize yourself with the symbols and colors. Each symbol represents a different color of floss.

Step 4: Start Stitching

1. Thread your needle with a single strand of embroidery floss. Standard embroidery floss comprises six individual strands; you'll often use only two strands for cross-stitching.
2. Begin stitching from the center of your design or follow the pattern's starting point.
3. Make diagonal stitches to form Xs for each symbol on the pattern. You can work in rows or sections, completing one color before moving on to the next.
5. To stitch, bring the needle up through the bottom left hole of the square and down through the top right hole to create one diagonal of the X. Then, bring the needle up through the bottom right hole and down through the top left hole to complete the X.

Step 5: Follow the Pattern

Refer to the pattern to determine which color to use for each symbol. Work row by row or section by section until you've completed the entire design. When you finish stitching an area or run out of floss, secure the ends on the back of the fabric by weaving the thread through several stitches before trimming off the excess.

Step 6: Finishing

Remove fabric from the embroidery hoop once you've completed your cross-stitch design. Trim any excess fabric, leaving a border around the design. You can frame your finished cross-stitch or turn it into a decorative item like a pillow or wall hanging.

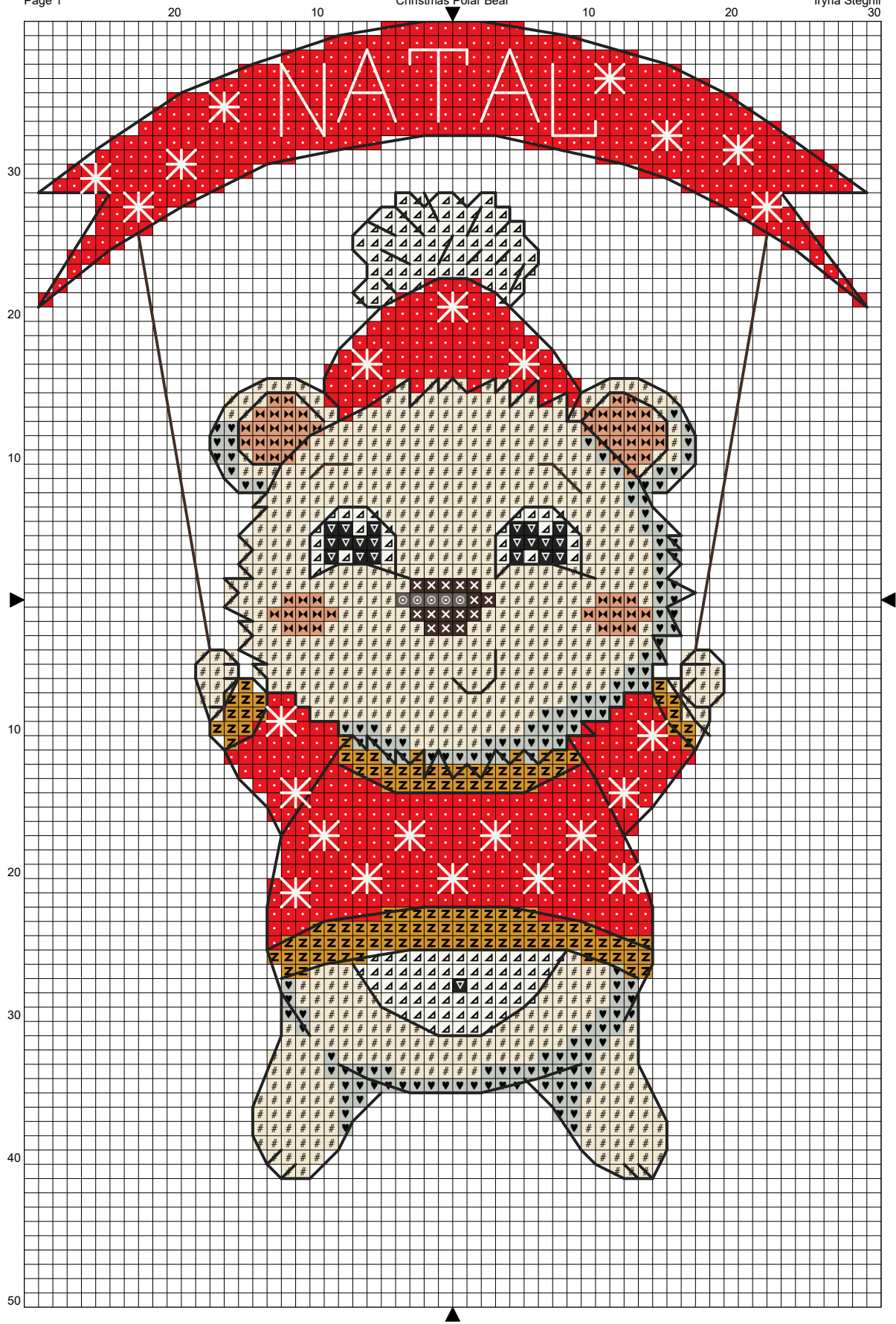

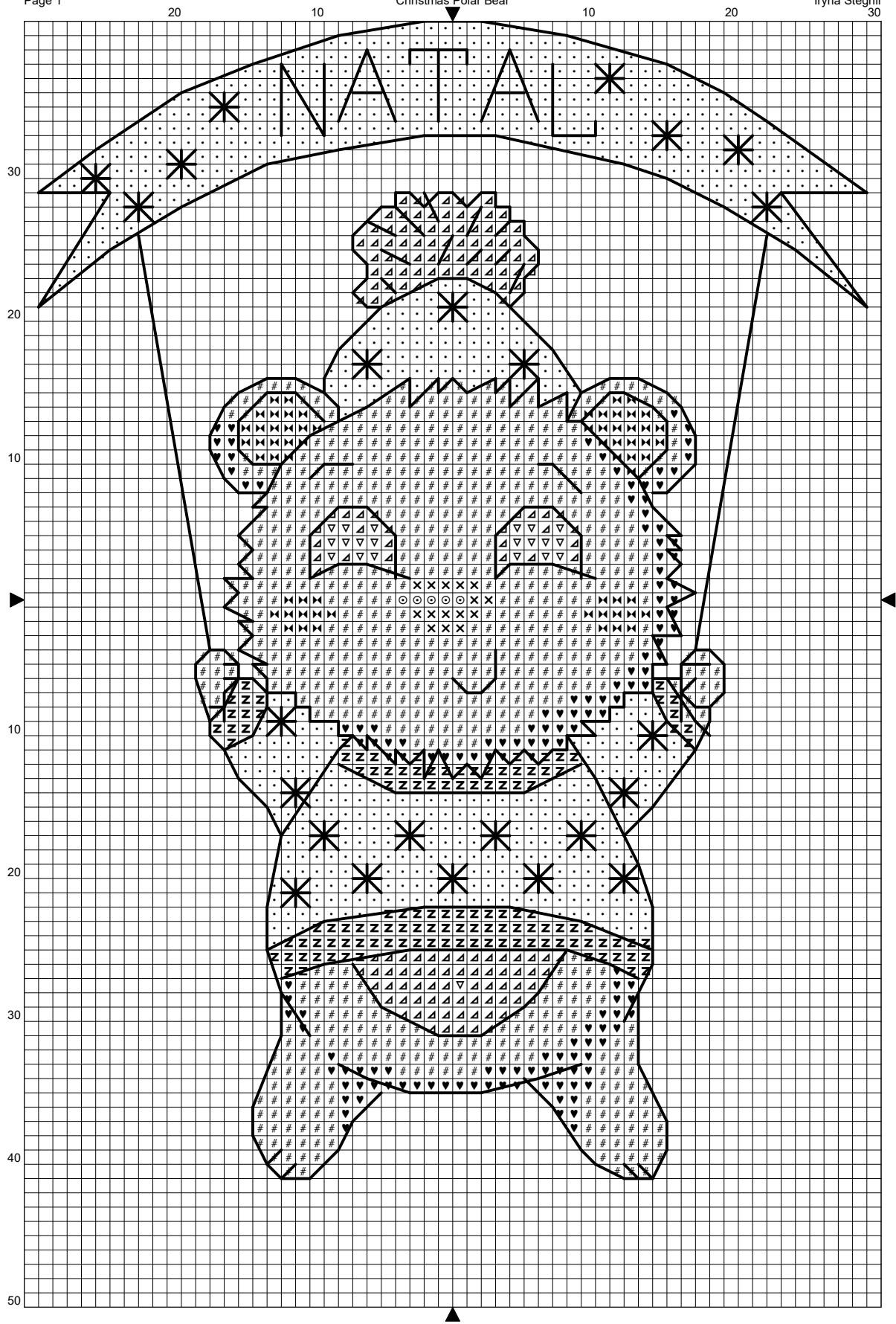

Fabric: 14 count Aida

Stitches: 58 x 81 **Size:** 4.14 x 5.79 inches or 10.52 x 14.70 cm

Colours: DMC

Use 2 strands of thread for cross stitch
